



CODE RODEO TAKES PLACE AS WE CHART OUR COMMUNITIES FUTURE



Building on the discussions held so far, the Code Rodeo event took place at Legion Hall with around 24 participants over two days. This gathering marked the beginning of the analysis of Place Type development standards and the overall structure of the Unified Development Code. Participants delved into the proposed Place Type zoning categories and explored potential standards for signage, civic spaces, and streets.

The meeting continued at the St. Louis Braden Keller Community Center on Tuesday, August 6th, with an introduction and open house aimed at reviewing draft development code standards through informal conversation. On Wednesday, August 7th, updates based on Tuesday's input were presented, followed by further opportunities for feedback on Place Type, signage, and civic space standards.

Feedback on the draft Place Type zoning standards will be accepted through Fall 2024. To learn more and share your thoughts, visit the project website at castroville.mysocialpinpoint.com.

Next Public Meeting: At the September 9th Community Roundup, draft maps will be available to show where these Place Types could be implemented across Castroville. Community input on the Place Type standards and rezoning map will continue through the Fall. The final Unified Development Ordinance, including all revisions, will then be presented to the Castroville Planning and Zoning Commission before moving on to the Castroville City Council for approval.

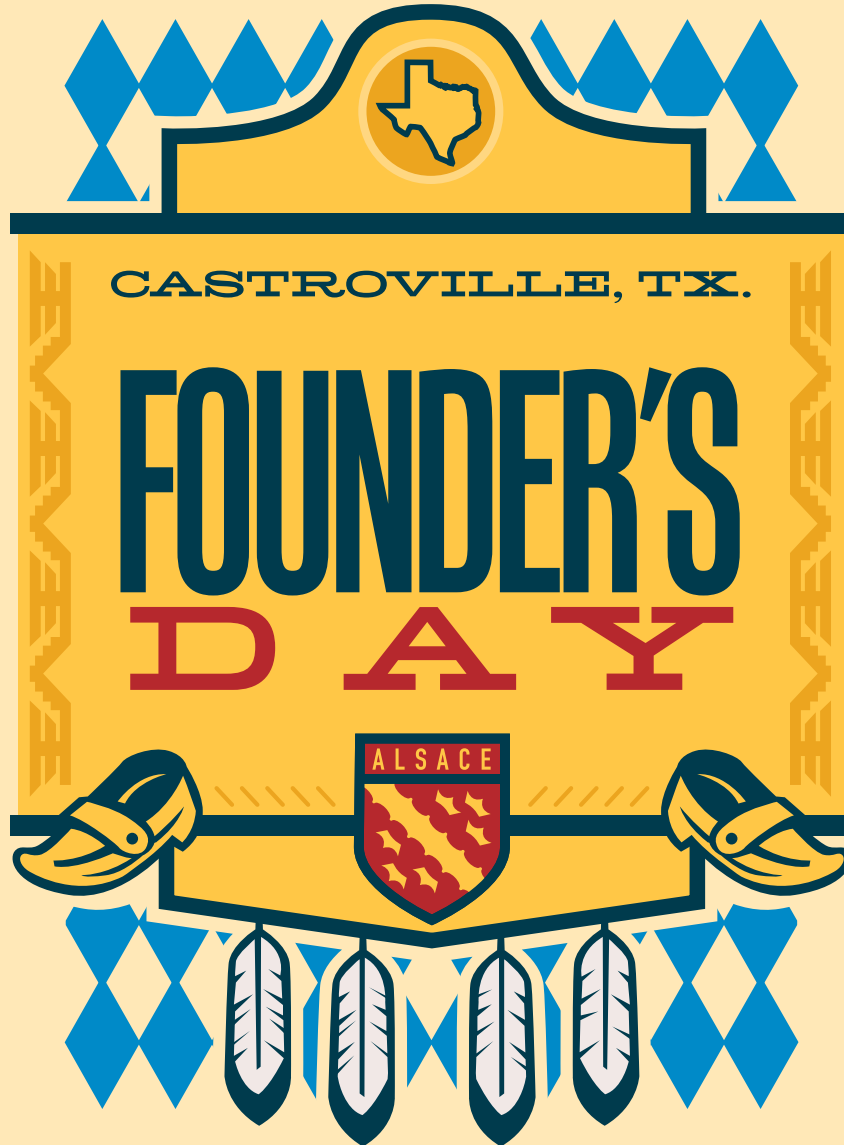

► MAYOR'S CORNER

Recognizing the critical importance of effective policing, the City Council of Castroville has taken significant steps to enhance the local police department for the benefit of the community. In April 2022, the City hired Jim Kohler as Interim Police Chief, bringing over thirty-five years of law enforcement experience. The City Council recognized Chief Kohler's expertise and tasked him with increasing the effectiveness of the police force.



POSITIVE CHANGE: When Chief Kohler started, we only had 60% of the approved officers, and half of what we have today. Chief Kohler collaborated with the outstanding officers already in place, set higher standards of professionalism, and diligently informed the City Council of the department's needs. He recommended specific training, equipment, and software, and hired exceptional new officers. With his leadership and the City Council's support, the police department has made tremendous progress.

CITY'S INVESTMENT: The safety and security of Castroville is a top priority, with the police department representing over 1/4 of the City's annual budget. As the city grows and faces new challenges, it remains committed to providing the police with the necessary resources to protect its citizens. Over the past two years, the City has invested in new equipment and technology, and secured a grant to fund two additional officers.

HOW THAT IMPACTS US: A quality community-oriented police force fosters trust and cooperation between law enforcement and residents, leading to more effective crime prevention and a stronger sense of security. Recent successes, such as solving a rash of car burglaries and apprehending a fugitive on the loose, highlight the effectiveness of this approach. These cases were resolved through the commitment of both our police force and the residents who worked with them to find the offenders and bring them to justice.
