

A huge thank you to our City Council, Mayor, and community for making this possible—great things are ahead for Castroville!


I'VE FOUND A DEER FAWN!

WHAT DO I DO?

It is common for a mother deer to leave her fawn alone for extended periods. Young fawns are not yet strong enough to keep up with their mother throughout the day. She returns only a few times to feed her baby, who remains quietly hidden to avoid predators. If you come across a fawn by itself, the best thing to do is leave it alone, as the mother is usually nearby. Picking it up can do more harm than good, as it may interfere with the mother's care.

CODE ENFORCEMENT REMINDER: HOUSE NUMBERS

Is your house number clearly visible from the street?



Seconds Count in an Emergency

- Protect your family and your property by having large visible house numbers.
- Firefighters, law enforcement and paramedics will find you faster when your home is properly marked.
- A visitor, child or injured person may be unable to provide clear directions.

Use Large Visible Numbers

- Numbers need to be at least 4 inches tall and be facing the street.
- Put house numbers under lighting so they are visible at night.
- Post house number on both sides of mailbox at the end of driveway.

On the House: Away from obstruction and with proper lighting



AND
Near the Road: Visible from both sides

CONNECTING CASTROVILLE: THE VISION FOR THE NORTHERN ROUTE

I think that everyone can agree that the last decade has challenged us with a volume of traffic that nobody truly expected. The growth around Castroville has created a daily traffic count of nearly 35,000 cars per day in a town of just 3,500 people.

Since the moment I started in the role of Mayor, I have been working with city council, city staff, the county, TxDOT, US Department of Transportation (USDOT), and other volunteers to find ways to alleviate this traffic.

One major piece of that puzzle is the “Northern Route” – a connector between Hwy 90 at Victory Lane and FM 471 north of Fitwell. The design includes sidewalks and pedestrian access, balancing vehicle flow with mobility for all. You can find renderings on the following page.

This project will be completed in stages and the majority will be paid for by the developers as their developments continue to be built out, but we are asking the county to help with the small sections that are outside city limits, since most of the traffic is county traffic. The roadway will initially be built as a 60' corridor with one lane in each direction and a center turn lane. Sufficient Right-of-Way (ROW) is being acquired to expand to a 120' thoroughfare in the future. For context, Hwy 90 is only 100' wide between the river and the hill, so the Northern Route street sections will be similar, but with enhanced pedestrian access and extremely limited driveway access.

Without this arterial, all of the growth happening north of Castroville, all the way up to Rio Medina, will continue to crash down on Hwy 90 from 471 – or continue to cut through Country Village as a “Short Cut.” This is just one part of the city’s thoroughfare plan. Other projects include a re-design of the Hwy 90 and 471 intersection. TxDOT has developed preliminary designs to add turning lanes and expand the intersection to allow for greater capacity and improved safety.

I have travelled to Austin to work with TxDOT leadership, and to Washington DC to work with USDOT many times to advocate for our little town and find ways to alleviate the ever growing traffic issue. I was able to participate in a USDOT study over the last couple of years that was studying how to deal with US 90. One of the most significant successes in that was that we identified the need to identify routes to go around all the cities from 211 west to Uvalde, starting with Castroville. It will take years to design and decades to build, but you have to start somewhere and it will take continued work to bring this to reality.

While growth is never easy, please rest assured that your city leadership is working tirelessly to face this challenge head on. My request of each one of you is to get involved. I know it’s stressful to deal with this growth, but we’re stronger when we work together. I encourage you to work with your elected leaders – both in the city and the county – to learn more about what’s happening and how you can lean in and help.





Northern Route (Loop Road + North/South Connectors to Hwy 90)



Initial Build



- One lane each direction
- One Left Turn Lane
- Limited points of access
- One sidewalk with green buffer (south side of road)
- 40-45 MPH Speed Limit

Final Build



- Two lanes each direction
- Separated by green strip except at cross streets
- Limited points of access
- Two sidewalk with green buffer (each side of road)
- 40-45 MPH Speed Limit
