STRD Has Arrived! ***Here's What you Need to Know***


Trash Can Delivery and Transition

- New STRD trash cans will be delivered on **September 25 & 26**.
- Waste Management (WM) will collect your old trash cans during the same week.
- Please place WM cans in your normal service location for pickup.
- As soon as your new STRD can is delivered, begin using it immediately.
- Each household will automatically receive:
 - 1 trash can (Black Can with Black Lid)
 - 1 recycling bin (Black Can with Green Lid)
- Each cart will have a unique ID number tied to your account to assist with recovery if lost or stolen.
- If you require additional carts, call (830) 931-4070. (*Additional fees will apply.*)



Trash Cart Delivery and Transition

- **Trash Pickup Days:**
 - **Tuesday:** West of FM 471 & North of Hwy 90
 - **Thursday:** East of FM 471 & South of Hwy 90
- **Recycling Pickup:**
 - Every Wednesday (citywide)
- **Brush Pickup:** Up to 8 cubic yards per request; on-call service. To schedule, call (830) 426 - 4260 or (830) 426 - 4261
- **Roll Off Containers:** Call (830) 931 - 4070

Castroville's Small Businesses Depend on Outside Spending

Castroville, Texas, with its Alsatian heritage and historic charm, continues to draw attention in the Texas Hill Country. While residents form the foundation of the town's culture, the long-term success of its small businesses depends on something less visible but critically important—visitors from outside the community.

Small, locally owned shops and restaurants give Castroville its unique character, but local spending alone cannot sustain them. Only 24.8% of downtown shoppers come from the 78009 zip code, which stretches well beyond city limits. Along Highway 90, the numbers are about the same. With just 3,141 city residents, the share of true locals shopping downtown is even smaller. Even Castroville's largest sales tax generator reports that only 29% of its business comes from 78009 residents.

This reliance on outside dollars is not unique to Castroville, but it is vital to understand. Visitors who come to town spend money at shops, dine at restaurants, attend events, and explore historic sites. Their spending translates directly into increased sales tax revenue, stronger businesses, and a more vibrant community. Without this steady flow, many storefronts would struggle to remain open.

In recent years, Castroville has seen steady growth in visitor traffic. Events like Fiorella Friday, Old Fashion Christmas, and the Fourth of July celebration have become key drivers, drawing hundreds of people who shop, eat, and explore while they are here. The revitalization of downtown has also played a major role,
